Ecuador Vision Mission XXI Mission Dates: December 8-15, 2019

Our 21st annual visit to Ecuador was another success, but not without its share of twists and turns. We chose to postpone the date originally scheduled for October, due to civil unrest in Ecuador. The government reduced long-standing fuel subsidies, causing prices to rise and tensions as well. As tensions eased and we felt it was safe, we moved forward and our mission team was able to perform over 200 cataract and 20 strabismus procedures.

Because of the delay in our trip, it caused conflicts with many schedules and plans. But the surgical team was fortunate and pleased to welcome two "pinch-hitters" who jumped in to fill the void.

Dr. Michael Bartiss, from North Carolina, filled the pediatric ophthalmology spot, when our original team member had to cancel, due to an illness in the family. He also recruited Martina Spivey, his wonderful surgical nurse, who was a pleasure to work with. On their first mission, both made an immediate and powerful impact on our team.

Similarly, Dr. Drew Stoken, a seasoned WBO veteran, also jumped in to cover for Eduardo Romo, who was not able to join us as he had planned. Dr. Stoken also recruited a newcomer, Kristen Bailey, another asset to the team. We are fortunate to have such a wealth of talented and dedicated volunteers!

However, the biggest adjustment we made was the result of a sudden illness to one of our team while in Ecuador. Bill Cluley, another WBO veteran, developed shortness of breath. The team quickly made alternative plans and Dr. Alley escorted Bill back to the U.S. for diagnosis and care.

It turned out to be a very good decision, as Bill was diagnosed with a bi-lateral pulmonary embolism – a very serious health condition. After proper care and a brief recovery, we're pleased to note that Bill is doing fine and considering his next mission.

The Dominican volunteers are a tremendous asset and always make us feel very welcome and right at home.

Looking Forward: Mission Planning For 2020...

As we stated earlier, the safety of our patients and team remains our highest priority. As we compile this newsletter, we are planning our annual trips to both Ecuador and the Dominican. The need for our help is there and we remain committed to providing that help. Any final decisions about the timing and specifics related to those missions will be made later in this calendar year.

Life Enhancement Awards

In 1999, World Blindness Outreach (WBO) created the Life Enhancement Award to assist individuals living in Southcentral Pennsylvania who are visually impaired. The award is designed to provide equipment or aid to enhance/improve the quality of life for an individual with a vision impairment. Over the past 21years, WBO has provided computers, software, video magnifiers, home modifications and educational toys to deserving recipients. Each of these items or services helped these individuals gain more independence and made a substantial difference in the quality of their lives.

So far this year, WBO has been able to provide an accessible scanner, portable video magnifier, an iPhone with accessible software and a custom-made computer to our awardees. These items make it easier for the individuals to read their mail and recipes, be more efficient at work, participate in various community programs and to stay connected with friends and family, ultimately enhancing their lives.
