# *Ecuador Mission – XXII* October 30-November 6, 2022

Once again, we were aided by our good friend Diego Benitez and Vista Para Todos (Vision For All) in Ecuador. Dr. Ruben Landazuri, their head surgeon, helped us to complete over 175 procedures during our visit, including 30 strabismus procedures performed by Dr. Cynthia Alley.

We were very pleased to have Dr. Julio Martinez return to our team in Ecuador. He was a member of our inaugural mission to Nigeria in 1990 and 15 other missions following. But the demands of his own practice limited his ability to join us in recent years. That young, energetic and talented surgeon we met over 30 years ago, returned to us as a mature and successful surgeon, with even more talent and passion for serving others. He was a great addition to the talented and experienced mission team who worked tirelessly to complete another efficient and successful mission in Ecuador.

# **Dominican Republic – XXVII** May 7-13, 2023

In spite of the delay, we achieved tremendous results, performing 30 cataract procedures and five corneal transplants!
