Dear Friends & Supporters,

Linda's connection clearly opened that door and provided some of the connections we needed to be successful.



One of the many highlights of our momentus past year was working with Dr. Diana Vittini, who volunteered as an interpreter for us more than 10 years ago. Today she manages an eye clinic in Nagua! To express WBO's appreciation for her dedication, Dr. Alley presented a book to Dr. Vittini that was co-authored by Dr. Joseph Sassani, another colleague and professor of ophthalmology at Hershey Medical Center.

Our Rotary friends in DR and a group called Vista Para Todos in Ecuador are two of the very best examples of why we have such impact and sustainability. They are an extension of WBO's good will and dedication, but they also have local knowledge that we lack. They help us in so many ways and they are invaluable to our success.

Dominican Republic Vision Mission - XXV January 13-20, 2019

Like several other previous Dominican missions, we were once again blessed with the energy and enthusiasm of youth. In addition to Resident Michael Langue, MD, from Penn State Hershey's Ophthalmology program, we had nine students from Lebanon High School and their chaperones with us. They participated in lectures to understand procedures and played key roles in most aspects of pre-op and sterilization – and observed in the OR.

We hope this experience lights a fire, like it has for Diana Vittini. We met Diana 10 years ago, when she joined us to serve as a student interpreter. Her experienced helped to fuel her goal to pursue ophthalmology and she now works by our side in the OR and coordinates an ophthalmology program in Nagua. It was equally rewarding to work with my daughter, Cynthia, an ophthalmologist herself who joined our surgical team to perform 15 pediatric strabismus procedures. We are also grateful to Dr. Iftikhar Chaudhry who joined us again this year to perform corneal transplants.

Because of our 25th anniversary mission, we were guests at several very nice dinner celebrations, where team members and WBO received many certificates and framed citations recognizing our continued commitment to the many less fortunate who live in the Dominican Republic. We met the Mayor and City Council and most importantly, we made plans for a return trip to Salcedo in 2020.

Another special aspect of the trip was Jere Gish and his colleague, Harold Trulear from WGAL News 8. Jere, who is a host of their morning news show, and his videographer, Harold, filmed and aired a special one-hour feature summarizing the work and impact of our mission. We were honored to have Jere and WGAL play such an important role in sharing our story of bringing light into the darkness.

Our student volunteers also spent a day at a local orphanage, delivering gifts and spending time with the children there. But perhaps the most memorable part of this mission was my daughter Linda's return, with the WBO team, to La Pascuala, her Peace Corps home from 25 years ago. In addition to the team completing a facelift of the Linda Alley Medical Clinic, she was able to reunite with some old and dear friends there – especially Lupita Calcano, who was her home away from home, many years ago.
